We want to be confident that communication is ongoing, accurate, prompt, and goes both ways. No problem is too big or too small for us to work together to resolve.








## **Nurse Notes**

New Years Resolutions and Healthy Eating!

The start of the year is always a popular time to start creating healthy habits. Obesity is on the leading causes of chronic illnesses and death. The website offers a way to develop individual eating plans and helps all ages groups understand what their daily diet should look like. We encourage you to sit down with your students and discuss the importance of a healthy diet!



#### Parents & Guardians:

Influenza season has arrived, and a high incidence rate has been reported in the area. We are also seeing a high rate of gastrointestinal viruses, strep, and other common illnesses. Please be mindful of the illness policy and keep your students at home when they are feeling ill. See the guidelines below to help determine if your student should stay home and when they are able to return. We appreciate your help in keeping our students and staff healthy! Your child is too sick to go to school and should remain home if any of these symptoms are present:

Has a temperature of 100 degrees or above. When your child has been fever-free for 24 hours (WITHOUT FEVER-REDUCING MEDICATION), is feeling better and has no other symptoms, he/she may return to school.

Has pain from earache, headache, sore throat, or a recent injury that interferes with their daily activity.

has a consistent cough that interferes with the child's daily routine.

Has vomiting or diarrhea. (Must be free of symptoms for 24 hours before returning)

Has green or yellow drainage from the eyes.

Has broken out in an unknown/contagious rash.

Has a contagious disease such as chickenpox, strep throat, pinkeye, or COVID-19. (call nurse if unsure when student can return, follow doctors order and 24-hour rule for most illnesses)

Here we are halfway through the school year. We are looking forward to celebrating National School Breakfast Program March 4-8. Breakfast gives students a great start every day and that week we will pick some of their favorite items to have for breakfast.

Carlisle High School is in full stride as we focus on our 4 high school pillars: Academics, Athletics, Fine and Performing Arts, and Community.

Academics: January 16 marks the beginning of the second semester. During the months of January and February students in grades 8-11 will begin to explore the courses they want to take for

the 2024-2025 school year. Our guidance counseling department is taking the time to meet with groups of students and individual students with the constant focus of preparing our students for life after high school. Some important testing dates to note.

March 12: Juniors take the ACT, April 18 & 19: English II End of Course (EOC) assessments, April 29 & 30: Algebra I and Geometry End of Course (EOC) assessments, May 2: Biology End of Course (EOC) assessments, May 3: History & Government End of Course (EOC) assessments

Athletics: Girls and boys basketball, wrestling, cheerleading, and swimming continue as we progress through the winter athletic season. Baseball, softball, and track and field athletic seasons will begin in the spring. All athletic teams are focused on either in season practices or off season training. All high school students are encouraged to join a sports team as many lifelong skills such as teamwork, goal setting, and determination can be strengthened through athletics.

Fine and Performing Arts: Our high school pep band can be heard at almost all home basketball games adding an extra level of school spirit to the atmosphere. In addition to our typical courses, the high school will also be preparing for spring musicals, plays, and band concerts. Please visit our website for more information.

The HS also offers multiple muse machine performances where students have the opportunity to listen to professional musicians from a variety of genres. These performances are during the school day and are closed to the public.

**Community:** It is important to always maintain a sense of community within our school as well as connect with all of our community members. As we "spring" forward to the second semester, Chamberlain Junior High will start to focus on the Ohio State Tests. Students are using our web-based Edmentum/ Exact Path during Primetime to focus on learning gaps and specialized interventions in math and ELA. This program is used on every student for an indicator of grade level performance. Students compete for trophies and rewards as they are learning.

What can parents do to help? Parents, you can go to this web site and practice with your student at <a href="https://login2.cambiumtds.com/student\_core/V70/Pages/LoginShell.aspx?c=Ohio\_PT">https://loginShell.aspx?c=Ohio\_PT</a>. Please be positive with your student. Make sure they are getting rest prior to testing. This isn't a pass/ fail test. It is a performance based test that lets us know how your student is performing compared to their peers at the local, state, and national level. Testing dates will be ELA April 18-19, Math 4/29-30th, and Science (8th grade only) May 2-3rd.

8<sup>th</sup> grade students entering high school next year will begin to look at future classes and tracks they will pursue during their next four years. Our high school counselors will meet with all 8<sup>th</sup> graders during the day to go over choices of classes. There will be a parent meeting to answer any questions parents may have about courses or student tracks they may take.







## CARLISLE ELEMENTARY (PS-3) SCHOOL NEWS- Principal Mike Milner

**Grade Level (Special) Activities** – I wanted to use the district newsletter this quarter to share some learning activities and experiences that our students have taken part in (or will be taking part in) this year.

Kindergarten – In Kindergarten classes, the students are looking forward to celebrating their 100th day of school in February. They will signify the 100th day by incorporating engaging activities that will challenge them to count to 100 and make groups of 10's counting to 100. Each year, the students have an outstanding time dressing up like they are 100 years old. In Language Arts, our Kindergarten students are working hard on word building and sentence writing. Also, they are working on learning to decode new words in their decodable readers. Please remember the importance of practicing both math and literacy skills at home with your child and returning monthly homework. In May, the teachers and students are looking forward to the field trip to the Cincinnati zoo along with our Kindergarten graduation!

First Grade – First grade is learning about many fun things! After winter break, we learned about New Year's resolutions. The students all wrote about new things they would like to learn about or positive goals they had for the new year. In Math, we have been learning about measuring with standard and non-standard units. We used centimeter cubes to measure many things around the room. These hands-on materials get the students excited and strengthen their understanding. In Reading, we have been using a phonemic awareness program called Heggerty every day to support the Science of Reading. Students enjoy listening and producing important sounds needed for reading and spelling. We encourage families to continue to read together nightly to build fluency. Reading to and with your child also builds their vocabulary. This time creates a positive bonding time that children will look forward to, as well.

Second Grade – Hello from Second Grade! We have some exciting things coming up this Spring. Our students will be learning how to follow a step-by-step recipe. The Carlisle Schools Cafeteria is going to help us teach the students to make pizza. This will help the students practice reading skills, and we will write an instructional paragraph about the experience after it's complete. On February 28th, all 2nd graders will be attending the orchestra with Mrs. Fitzpatrick. We will go to the Masonic Center to see "Peter and the Wolf." The students will learn how music and dance work together to tell stories. They will get a taste of the ballet, opera, and philharmonic. In May, we will be going to Caesar's Creek. The students will learn about fossils, plants, and animals that used to live in Ohio. This Spring is going to be filled with fun activities for the students!

Third Grade – During the second quarter, students learned about matter in science and local government in social studies. Students also had their Winter Music Concert. On October 16<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup>, third graders went to the Boonshoft Museum. Students participated in a "Do-Lab" where they did experiments to learn more about states and properties of matter. Students were also able to take a tour of the museum. On December 19<sup>th</sup> students participated in their music concert, a "Winter Spectacular". Mrs. Fitzpatrick, the 1-6 music teacher, led the performance. Many students had solos and we had our own "Rock-n-Roll Snowman". Students put on an excellent performance! On January 24<sup>th</sup>, Carlisle's Mayor and City Manager spoke to our students in the auditorium. They spoke about the structure of Carlisle's local government, their jobs, and answered students' questions. Students loved seeing and speaking to the leaders that they were learning about in class.
