



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STAY INFORMED:

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It is difficult to believe that the 2023 – 2024 school year is one-fourth of the way completed. It seems like we just started this year, and we are already looking at 1st quarter grades and the start of the winter sports soon. The Fall was full of wonderful achievements and accomplishments for our students and staff in all areas – academics, arts, and athletics. Our district report card came out and, while there were areas which were average and above average, we have some areas on which we need to focus and make a concerted effort to improve. The report cards were revamped so that instead of receiving a letter grade, each district and building received a number of stars based on their performance. The highest rating was 5 stars, which we received in our Graduation Rate, 97.4%. We received 4 stars in the areas of Gap Closing, which deals with subgroups, and Early Literacy, which references Kindergarten through 3rd grade. We earned 3 stars in the area of Achievement, which reflects “student performance on state tests met established thresholds and how well students performed on tests overall.” This is acceptable by many standards but an area to which we will certainly give some attention. The areas that really need our focused attention are Progress, “the growth all students are making based on their past performances,” and “College, Career, Workforce and Military Readiness.” We will continue to work in the areas of our strengths and concentrate on our weaknesses to make improvements in all areas, especially the last two. We will soon be heading into the season of inclement weather and questionable travel conditions for our students and staff. We will do everything necessary to assure the safety of everyone traveling to school and get that message out as soon as possible, whether it is a delay or a closing. We are in contact with area and county districts during these conditions and will usually go with the majority of those districts. The announcement for these will go out through a One Call Now notification, as well as on local TV and radio stations. We understand that not everyone will agree with the decision made and as a parent, you have the right to make the decision that you feel is best for your student.

There has been a lot in the news and on social media about Artificial Intelligence and its use in schools, as well as in other areas of our lives. We are working with local agencies, the Ohio Department of Education, local legislators, and our staff, to make sure that this is used properly and according to guidelines in place for its usage. It is already covered, in general, in our Acceptable Use Policy and we will work to have more specific language coming soon. We see this as a tool to enhance the teaching and learning process, much as the calculator, computer, and Smart Board are tools to enhance instruction and student work and not to replace it. As we get more detailed about this, we will share with students and parents. At this time, teachers will be setting guidelines in their classrooms as to the extent of its use.

The best way to put the wheels of improvement in motion is to use the chain of command and let the process work the way it was intended. Most information is found at the most basic level, which is why it is so important for there to be such open dialogue between the students and their teachers. Depending on the age of the student or the issue at hand, the parents are urged to reach out to the teacher, should the need arise. With everything we have in place, which is a great working relationship between the school and the community, due to ongoing communication and support for one another, we can continue to make Carlisle Schools what we know that it can be – a great place to learn and grow.

Once we realize and keep in mind that we are really all on the same team and have the same goal in mind – the education and overall success of our students – it will certainly be much easier for us to work together to the realization of that goal. 

TAKE "3" FLU PREVENTION FROM THE CDC + TAKE TIME TO GET FLU VACCINE



CDC recommends a yearly flu vaccine as the first and most important step in protecting against flu viruses.

There are many different flu viruses and the vaccine is designed yearly to hit a targeted strain of flu.

Flu vaccination can reduce flu illnesses, doctor's visits, missed work or school due to flu as well as prevent deaths or hospitalization.

Everyone 6 months of age or older should get a flu vaccine yearly.

Those at high risk for flu complications include young children, pregnant women, those with chronic health conditions, and people 65 years and older.

TAKE EVERYDAY PREVENTATIVE ACTIONS TO STOP THE SPREAD OF GERMS

Try to avoid close contact with sick people
While sick, limit contact with others
If you are sick with flu like illness, CDC recommends staying home for at least 24 hours after your fever is gone.
(Should be fever free for 24 hours without the use of a fever reducing medication)
Cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze
Wash your hands often with soap and water. Alcohol-based hand rub is good if soap and water not available.
Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth

TAKE FLU ANTIVIRAL DRUGS IF YOUR DOCTOR PRESCRIBES THEM

Antiviral drugs are different from antibiotics.
Antiviral drugs can make your illness milder and shorten duration and prevent complications.
They work best if treatment is started within 2 days of getting sick but can be started later.
Flu-like symptoms include fever, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, body aches, headache, chills, and fatigue. Occasionally vomiting and diarrhea.

Hearing and Vision Screening Requirements

Visual and hearing impairment can easily go undetected and can play a major role in a child's educational journey. For this reason, the Ohio Department of Health requires hearing and vision screenings for students in certain grade levels each year. These screenings were completed this fall. If your child was screened and failed the hearing or vision screening a referral letter will be mailed home in October. If you receive a referral letter from the nurses, please take the forms and make an appointment with an audiologist or optometrist as soon as possible. If you have any questions related to the screenings or need resources for a vision or hearing provider the nurses can help assist you in that process.





**STUDENT GOES TO STATE HOUSE**

Natalie Osborne, who is a current 6th grader at Carlisle Elementary, was born with bilateral sensorial hearing loss which requires her to wear hearing aids. In Ohio hearing aids and related services are not covered under health insurance. Families are responsible for covering all expenses. On May 10, Natalie had the opportunity to testify for House Bill 152, “Madaline’s Law” at the Ohio House of Representatives Insurance Committee. If this Bill passes it would require health insurance to cover costs for childhood hearing aids.

Natalie spent the day at the State House in Columbus where she testified about her need to wear hearing aids. She shared about obstacles she has with school, sports and everyday life and how her hearing aids are a necessity for her. Natalie told the State Representatives how she wears her hearing aids “all waking hours.” She argued that childhood hearing aids, which are considered cosmetic devices by many insurance providers in Ohio, are required for safety, education and everyday life and should be provided to every child in Ohio who has hearing loss. Natalie was honored to represent the children of Ohio who wear hearing aids.

House Bill 152 is sponsored by State Representatives Bob Young (R-Green) and Casey Weinstein (D-Hudson).

This Bill would require health insurers to cover up to \$2,500 per individual hearing aid for Ohio residents under the age of 22 and it would also require coverage for related services such as hearing aid fittings and hearing exams.

“This bill is a step forward in supporting Ohio kids and families, and I am so proud that it received overwhelming bipartisan support,” Weinstein said in a statement. “I believe that every child has the right to hear, grow, and thrive, and passing Madeline’s Law sends a message that we are fighting to make that a reality in Ohio.”

“One of the biggest hurdles for Ohio families is the high cost of hearing aids. These devices can cost upwards of \$6,000, which is daunting, especially for families on a budget,” Young said in a statement. “We cannot afford to overlook the importance of hearing health in our children’s overall well-being. I hope Madeline’s Law continues to receive strong support in the Senate.”

Madeline’s Law, named after Ohio native Madeline Rohlin, would add Ohio to the list of 25 other states that require insurance providers to cover hearing aid costs for children.

House Bill 152, which passed in the House, is now awaiting further hearings in the Senate. Natalie is anticipating the opportunity to testify in the Senate.
